Dear Friends in Christ:

In our first reading today, from the Acts of the Apostles, we heard of the choosing of Matthias to take the place of Judas. This early group of twelve, apostles, was an important structure for the early Churches. Later it disappears as a group of twelve and simple becomes the group of those who lead the various Churches. The early believers had no doubt that God would guide them. Some doubted, for sure, the assembly of believers in general trusted that God would show the way. God had always shown the way. For us God has always shown the way. God shows the way now. The way is always seen in the believers assembled together with their leaders. Sometimes it is seen in the gathering of the leaders together as an assembly.

We who come later can see this slow formation of the Church Jesus founded. It is like any new life: it does not step fully formed from its beginnings.

The touchstone for this faith is found in the second reading today, from the First Letter of John: Whoever acknowledges that Jesus is the Son of God, God remains in him and he in God. If someone has no faith, that person cannot be part of the assembly seeking God's will. It is only a fraud. Through the centuries there have been plenty of frauds. Even today in our parishes, in our dioceses, in the Church at large, there are frauds. Yet we must be cautious about identifying others as frauds. None of us is perfect. None of us is without sin. If we separate ourselves apart and claim to have the whole truth, this is normally a sign of being in error.

Let us commit ourselves to the truth, to seeking the truth, to seeking the truth together. There are times when we may be convinced that only we have the truth, but may we not embrace that path. Only God has the truth, only Jesus and only the Holy Spirit—and this is always found in the Church in union with the whole Church.

Saint Philip Neri

Feast Day: May 26

Philip Neri was born in Florence in 1515. As a young adult, he made his home in Rome. At age 35, he was ordained a priest. He soon became known for his ministry of giving young men spiritual direction in an unusual way. He liked to challenge them with their own vanity. For example, once a man asked Philip if he thought wearing a hair shirt under his clothes, which were very elegant, was a good penance. Philip said it would be a good penance if he wore the hair shirt over his nice clothes. Philip's best-known achievement is that he founded the Roman Congregation of the Oratory. He used humor as his medicine. He went around Rome with half his beard shaved off, did silly dances and gave young men penance that involved them making fools of themselves in public. Maybe he used his sense of humor to balance his extremely serious side. It is said that Philip would need to hear jokes or read funny stories which distracted him just a little from total absorption in the glory of God, so that he could concentrate better when offering the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

Philip had a tremendous capacity for love. This may be the reason for a vision he had: On the eve of Pentecost, 1544, Philip saw a vision of a ball of fire enter through his mouth and go to his heart. He was immediately filled with an intense divine love and fell to the floor, crying out, "Enough, enough, Lord, I can bear no more!"

St Philip Neri is the patron saint of joy. He is a powerful intercessor for people who experience times of feeling very down. When we are tempted to agonize over how we look, or worry over what others think of us, we can ask this saint to help us think about the joy of being alive and pleasing God instead of pleasing other people.

CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

"I BELIEVE" - "WE BELIEVE"

We begin our profession of faith by saying: "I believe" or "We believe". Before expounding the Church's faith, as confessed in the Creed, celebrated in the liturgy and lived in observance of God's commandments and in prayer, we must first ask what "to believe" means. Faith is man's response to God, who reveals himself and gives himself to man, at the same time bringing man a superabundant light as he searches for the ultimate meaning of his life. Thus we shall consider first that search, then the divine Revelation by which God comes to meet man, and finally the response of faith.

MAN'S CAPACITY FOR GOD

HOW CAN WE SPEAK ABOUT GOD?

In defending the ability of human reason to know God, the Church is expressing her confidence in the possibility of speaking about him to all men and with all men, and therefore of dialogue with other religions, with philosophy and science, as well as with unbelievers and atheists.

Since our knowledge of God is limited, our language about him is equally so. We can name God only by taking creatures as our starting point, and in accordance with our limited human ways of knowing and thinking.

All creatures bear a certain resemblance to God, most especially man, created in the image and likeness of God. The manifold perfections of creatures - their truth, their goodness, their beauty all reflect the infinite perfection of God. Consequently we can name God by taking his "creatures perfections as our starting point, for from the greatness and beauty of created things comes a corresponding perception of their Creator."

God transcends all creatures. We must therefore continually purify our language of everything in it that is limited, image

bound or imperfect, if we are not to confuse our image of God - "the inexpressible, the incomprehensible, the invisible, the ungraspable" - with our human representations. Our human words always fall short of the mystery of God.

Admittedly, in speaking about God like this, our language is using human modes of expression; never the less it really does attain to God himself, though unable to express him in his infinite simplicity. Likewise, we must recall that "between Creator and creature no similitude can be expressed without implying an even greater dissimilitude"; and that "concerning God, we cannot grasp

THE STORY OF THE MIRACULOUS MEDAL

The story of the Miraculous medal is a true and inspiring one about a French girl named Catherine Laboure, now Saint Catherine. Upon losing her mother to illness, nine-year old Catherine took a statue of the Blessed Virgin down from her bedroom wall and said, “**Now, dear Lady, you are to be my mother.**”

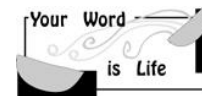
After helping to raise her siblings and care for her widowed father, Catherine became a postulant in the Daughters of Charity hospice in Paris, France. Sister Catherine prayed that she would see the Blessed Mother face to face.

On the night of July 18, 1830, Mary appeared to Catherine and said, “**God wishes to charge you with a mission. You will be contradicted, but do not fear; you will have the grace to do what is necessary.**” Our Lady forewarned of great persecution in the world, and then she disappeared.

Four months later, on November 27, Catherine had another vision of our Lady. This time, Mary, standing on a globe above the chapel altar, gave Catherine a direct order, “**Have a medal struck after this model. All who wear it will receive great graces.**”

Catherine did as instructed, and almost immediately blessings began to shower down on those who wore Mary’s medal. The devotion spread like wildfire, and before long people were calling it the “Miraculous” Medal. Within ten years, 100 million medals had been distributed through the world.

The Association of the Miraculous Medal in Perryville, Missouri, carries on Saint Catherine’s mission today, bring Jesus to the world through devotion to our Lady and her Miraculous Medal.
