Dear friends in Christ,

The Gospel of Matthew today reminds us that the greatest is the one who serves. This calls us to examine our consciences towards God, towards one another and towards ourselves. We can find that we don't always like serving--and that is normal. The challenge is to choose serving, not necessarily to like it. We can find that we break faith with God and others and ourselves--and that is normal. The challenge is to renew our faith, to repent and to ask pardon.

We are all one in Christ! Each day and especially on Sundays we are invited to deepen that relationship in Christ, with one another and also with ourselves. We come to celebrate Eucharist to renew these relationships and to know once again the love that Christ has for us. Like all love, we can become accustomed to how things are and forget the incredible gift that comes to us with love.

When we ask ourselves if we have broken faith, it is not because we want to think badly of ourselves or condemn ourselves. Instead, it is an invitation to renew our covenants and to allow God to work ever more profoundly within us. We come for healing, not for condemnation.

When we ask ourselves if we serve, it is not to think badly of ourselves when we see that we have been self-serving and not serving others. Rather, it is an invitation to start serving once again and to rejoice in the serving even when we may not want to serve. We rejoice because we know that we are trying to do what our Lord and Master has asked of us.

This Sunday is a time of refreshment in the Lord. It is a time to give thanks, to celebrate Eucharist, to delight in God's love. Yes, we always begin with penitence, because we want to love more. Yet we don't stay at the level of penitence. We are invited to live as Christ's own friends and His beloved. Let us rejoice in the Lord.

Saint Cecilia

Feast Day: November 22

Cecilia was a Roman girl who lived at the end of the fifth century. She was born to a patrician family, and was raised as a Christian. She fasted often, and wore a coarse garment beneath her rich clothing. She wished to remain a virgin, but her father required her to be engaged to a young pagan named Valerian. When the wedding day came, Cecilia sat apart from the guests, repeating psalms and praying. After the wedding ceremony, when the guests had gone home, Cecilia tried to explain her feelings to Valerian. She told him she already had a lover, an angel of God, who was very jealous. Valerian was both angry and afraid. He said, "Show me this angel. If he is of God, I shall refrain, as you wish, but if he is a human lover, you both must die." Cecilia answered, "If you believe in the one true and living God and receive the water of baptism, then you shall see the angel." Valerian agreed. Since this was a time of persecutions in Rome, he had to look hard for a priest. He found a bishop named Urban, who was in hiding among the tombs of the martyrs. The bishop baptized him. When the young husband

returned, he found an angel with flaming wings standing beside Cecilia. The angel placed chaplets of roses and lilies on their heads. The brother of Valerian, Tiburtius, was also converted; and after being baptized he also experienced many wonderful things.

Valerian and Tiburtius devoted themselves to good works and they made it their special duty to give proper burial to those Christians who were put to death by order of the Roman prefect Almachius. The two brothers themselves were soon sentenced for refusing to sacrifice to Jupiter. Maximus, a Roman officer charged with their execution, was converted by a vision that came to him in the hour of their death. After professing Christianity, he was also martyred. The three were buried by Cecilia, and a little later she herself was also sentenced to death. When Cecilia refused to renounce her faith, the Roman prefect gave an order that she was to be suffocated in her own bathroom. She survived this attempt on her life, so a soldier was sent to behead her. He struck at her neck three times, then left her lying, still alive, for it was against the law to strike a fourth time. She lingered on for three days. In dying, she bequeathed all her goods to the poor, and her house to the bishop for a Christian place of worship. She was buried in the crypt of the Caecilii at the catacomb of St. Callistus.

In the ninth century, Pope Paschal I moved the remains of many martyrs from the catacombs to new churches within the city; the relics of St. Cecilia, her husband, his brother, and the Roman officer Maximus, were all placed in the church of St. Cecilia. The origin of her veneration as a patron of music is unknown to us, but artists of later times have often depicted her at the organ, singing God's praise or listening to a choir of angels.

For over a thousand years St. Cecilia has been one of the most venerated martyrs of the early Church; she is among the seven martyrs named in the Canon of the Mass.


