Dear Friends in Christ:

The Gospel Reading of today from St. John, is taken from the Farewell Discourse at the Last Supper, and addresses concerns of the disciples

that would arise because of the departure of Jesus soon to occur. What are the disciples to do without him? What do we do without this reassuring presence?

The disciples are aware that Jesus is about to leave them. There is a heavy air of gloom and anxiety as the enemies of Jesus close in around him. "Do not let your hearts be troubled," are the encouraging words he speaks to them. "Trust in God still, and trust in me" is a call to total faith in the Father and in him. Trusting in God means accepting and facing reality. It means dealing with our problems knowing that even in worst-case scenarios, God will not allow us to be crushed and lost. We do our best with the proper means available to us and God will take care of the rest. The passage also assures them that Jesus will return and take his followers with him. The imminent departure of Jesus is presented not as a loss but as a preparation for the future. The expression '*many dwelling places*' of the Father's house suggests not a diversity of place within heaven but that there will be room enough for everyone in God's eternal presence.

"I am the way, and the truth and the life. No one can come to the Father except through me."

So what do we make of this saying of Jesus? What do they mean to us?

'I am the Way' – Jesus is a road. A road is a journey. And we go to God the Father through Jesus and we call Jesus the *Way*, because he is the visible manifestation in human form of all that his Father is.

'I am the Truth' – the Truth that meets us on the road. We Christians have not got the Truth. The Truth has got us. Jesus is God's gift of his true self to us. As God revealed His true self to Jesus, we look up to Jesus to reveal God to us.

'I am the Life' – this journey of Truth gives us life. When we believe in Jesus, we find life. More, He becomes our life.

In short, what living the Christian life is really all about is living with Jesus in faith. It is to make the Truth and the Life - the Father Himself - really ours by following Jesus who is the Way. St. Peter reminds us, we are a holy people, called to proclaim the one who called us out of darkness into light. In words and deeds we bear witness to the Risen Jesus, who says to us – "I am the way, and the truth and the life. No one can come to the Father except through me."

Saint Anselm

Feast Day: April 21

Anselm was born in the Piedmont region of Italy, around 1033. His mother was known to be a very devout woman. She chose to send Anselm to a school run by the Benedictine order.

As a boy, Anselm had a dream that he had met and spoken with God. He felt a very strong religious calling, but his mother had died young, and his father would not let him go to become a monk. He was 15 years old at the time.

Anselm was tired of the way his father treated him so he left home and wandered for three years. In Normandy, he met the Benedictine prior Lanfranc of Pavia and became his disciple. Lanfranc realized that Anselm was very intelligent and encouraged his vocation to religious life. Anselm was accepted into the order and ordained a priest at age 27. When Lanfranc was called to become abbot of another monastery in 1063, Anselm took over as Abbot.

Anselm became abbot of his own monastery in 1079. The Normans had recently conquered England, and they wanted to bring monks from Normandy to influence the Church in the country. Lanfranc became Archbishop of Canterbury, and died in the late 1080's. This was a difficult time for the English Church. King William Rufus refused to allow the appointment of a new archbishop. Anselm had gone back to his monastery, and did not want to return to England.

In 1092, the king of England changed his mind and allowed Anselm to become Archbishop of Canterbury. Anselm was reluctant to accept the appointment because he didn't want to be involved in more struggles with the English crown. Finally he accepted and insisted on the Church being allowed to govern itself. After three years of arguing about this with the king, which caused him to be exiled from England, he was finally successful, and was permitted to return in 1106. In the later years of his life, Anselm worked to reform the Church and continued his theological investigations. He was also a counsellor to Pope Gregory VII.

In a general audience given on Sept. 23, 2009, Pope Benedict XVI remembered St. Anselm as "a monk with an intense spiritual life, an excellent teacher of the young, a theologian with an extraordinary capacity for speculation, a wise man of governance and an intransigent defender of the Church's freedom."

St. Anselm was canonized by Pope Alexander in 1163 and chosen as a Doctor of the Church by Pope Clement XI in 1720. His motto was, "faith seeks understanding".

"I BELIEVE" - "WE BELIEVE"

We begin our profession of faith by saying: "I believe" or "We believe". Before expounding the Church's faith, as confessed in the Creed, celebrated in the liturgy and lived in observance of God's commandments and in prayer, we must first ask what "to believe" means. Faith is man's response to God, who reveals himself and gives himself to man, at the same time bringing man a superabundant light as he searches for the ultimate meaning of his life. Thus we shall consider first that search, then the divine Revelation by which God comes to meet man, and finally the response of faith.

MAN'S CAPACITY FOR GOD

THE KNOWLEDGE OF GOD ACCORDING TO THE CHURCH

"Our holy mother, the Church, holds and teaches that God, the first principle and last end of all things, can be known with certainty from the created world by the natural light of human reason." Without this capacity, man would not be able to welcome God's revelation. Man has this capacity because he is created "in the image of God".

In the historical conditions in which he finds himself, however, man experiences many difficulties in coming to know God by the light of reason alone:

Though human reason is, strictly speaking, truly capable by its own natural power and light of attaining to a true and certain knowledge of the one personal God, who watches over and controls the world by his providence, and of the natural law written in our hearts by the Creator; yet there are many obstacles which prevent reason from the effective and fruitful use of this inborn faculty. For the truths that concern the relations between God and man wholly transcend the visible order of things, and, if they are translated into human action and influence it, they call for self-surrender and abnegation. The human mind, in its turn, is hampered in the attaining of such truths, not only by the impact of the senses and the imagination, but also by disordered appetites which are the consequences of original sin. So it happens that men in such matters easily persuade themselves that what they would not like to be true is false or at least doubtful.

This is why man stands in need of being enlightened by God's revelation, not only about those things that exceed his understanding, but also "about those religious and moral truths which of themselves are not beyond the grasp of human reason, so that even in the present condition of the human race, they can be known by all men with ease, with firm certainty and with no admixture of error".
